


UNLOCK EUROPE'S MAJORITY





BRITAIN'S MOST TRIBAL ELECTION






Our poll shows that the **pro-Brexit** and **anti-Brexit** camps are evenly matched in voter intention at around 36%.

* Vote intention only for those who will definitely vote and excluding those that don't know.


Survey conducted on 9-10 May 2019 among 1,600 respondents.





The two camps are divided on the most basic question – **does the EU hold its nations back** or protect voters from the excesses of national governments?


A large majority of **Tory** voters lined up consistently in the **Eurosceptic tribe**, while most **Labour** ones join the **pro-Europeans**.





The same **two camps** are also
visible in response
to the question:


'Looking ahead, how likely or unlikely do you think it is that the **European Union** as it currently exists will **fall apart in the next ten to twenty years**?'





They are divided on what constitutes the single **greatest threat for Europe** today:

Pro-Europeans fear climate change or nationalism in Europe, whereas Brexiteers focus on Islamic radicalism or migration.






The two tribes don't agree on what constitutes a **good outcome for the European election**:

Most Tories, UKIP, and Brexit Party voters want nothing less than 'a revolution'.

Pro-Europeans hope for a vote of confidence in the EU.

* Based on a question: 'What in your view would be a good outcome of the European Parliament elections? Please tick up to three options which you agree with most' [from among nine available]






This polarised election will **punish those parties who are not clearly** in the remain or leave camps.

Only **57% of Labour** and **47% of Tories** plan to turn out to vote.

* Measured by share of '10' as a response to the question: 'On a scale from 0 to 10, where 0 means you will definitely not vote, and 10 means you definitely will vote, how likely, if at all, are you to vote in the elections to the European Parliament in May?'

SYSTEM IS BROKEN




The only thing that unites all sides is a sense that the **political** system is broken:

either just in Britain, or also in the EU.

* Based on answers to two questions:


Thinking about the following political systems, do you think they work well or are they broken:

IS BRITAIN UNIQUE?



SYSTEM IS BROKEN




Only in **France** and **Greece** is the share of those believing that both systems are broken higher.

Only in **Greece** and **Romania** are there as few people believing both systems work.

- 2. The European Union?




EU HOLDS GOVERNMENTS BACK



UK is equally divided as many other EU countries (and in keeping with the EU average) on whether the EU holds their nation back or protects voters from the excesses of national governments.

Is the EU holding your national government back, or preventing you from that government's excesses?




- Membership of the EU often protects us against the excesses or failures of our national governments
- Membership of the EU often holds our national governments back, and stops them doing what is best for the country

EU LIKELY TO FALL APART



Just as in many other EU countries (except for Spain, Denmark and Sweden), half of the population believes that the EU is likely to fall apart in the next ten to twenty years.

Looking ahead, how likely or unlikely do you think it is that the European Union as it currently exists will fall apart in the next ten to twenty years?



BIGGEST LOSS




UK voters are much less likely than other Europeans to miss freedoms to travel, trade and live and work across Europe in the case of the EU collapse.

But they would miss the EU security and defence cooperation more than the EU average.

In no other country was the share of the population saying **they wouldn't miss anything** as high as in the **UK (18%).**

France (13%) went second, followed by the Czech Republic (12%) and the Netherlands (11%).




HOPING FOR THE REVOLUTION



But we differ from the rest of the EU in seeing the lively debate or vote of confidence in the EU as much less important outcomes of this election – and being much more likely to hope for a 'revolution'.

Only in Greece (31%) are there more people hoping for the revolution than in the UK (23%).

Good outcome of the European Parliament elections




CLIMATE CHANGE AS A THREAT



On the other hand, in no other country (even Sweden or Denmark) do so many people see **climate change** as the greatest threat for Europe today as in the UK.

In turn, this is seen as the most important threat for Europe in Britain.
